Latin Resources appoints Anthony Begovich as new CFO

Latin Resources (**ASX: LRS**) has appointed Anthony Begovich its joint company secretary and chief financial officer.

Begovich is a chartered accountant with more than 16 years experience in the resources sector and has previously worked with PricewaterhouseCoopers with postings in Australia, Indonesia and London.

Over the last 10 years, he has worked with ASX companies as both company secretary and chief financial officer.

These include serving as company secretary and CFO of Golden West Resources (ASX: GWR) from 23 March 2009 to 18 November 2011 and in the same roles at Vulcan Resources from 31 August 2006.

Earlier this year Latin Resources made a move to expand its investor base into Europe through an international listing.

Latin was admitted to trading on the Stock Exchange Electronic Trading System – quotes and crosses (SETSqx) of the London Stock Exchange in late February.

This listing gives Latin access to additional resources focused investment groups as it progresses its projects, including the Guadalupe Iron Sands Project in Peru.

Towards the end of 2011, Latin delivered a maiden JORC Resource at Guadalupe which included 119 million tonnes at 5.7% total heavy mineral content.

Put in perspective, the “proof of concept” Inferred Mineral Resource estimate has been carried out over an initial 682 hectares area within the overall concession area of 16,437 hectares.

At the company’s Mariela Iron Ore Project, also in Peru, Latin is planning a drilling program which will begin in the June quarter this year.

The program will follow up on fieldwork which has defined a high intensity anomaly up to 3,000 metres long, 1,000 metres wide and 200 metres thick.
